


Yemen: Humanitarian Overview


Population in Need

The humanitarian crisis in Yemen continues to deteriorate with an estimated **21.1 million** people, **80% of the population**, in need of assistance. The UN revised its funding appeal in June 2015 upwards to \$1.6 billion to target 11.7 million people. Regardless of funding, there is limited capacity to handle the collapsing food and health sectors and deteriorating water and sanitation systems.




Displacement

According to UNHCR, more than **51,000** have departed from Yemen. Djibouti and Somalia have absorbed the majority of displaced, with more than 44,000 arrivals.



Food Security

With **90%** of food usually imported, food aid alone is insufficient to meet the needs of **12.9 million** people who are food insecure. Import restrictions and congestion at the main aid port, Al Hudaydah, are delaying aid and commercial shipments. Market prices are increasing for commodities such as wheat, cooking oil, and fuel.



Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) and Health

15.2 million people are in need of basic healthcare, with 160 health facilities damaged or closed due to conflict or shortages in fuel and medicine. Fuel is crucial for hospital generators and medical supplies. Fuel shortages have disrupted water pumping and trucking, leaving **20.4 million** in need of water and sanitation services. Health risks are increasing as outbreaks of dengue, malaria, cholera, measles, and diarrheal diseases are reported.
